

BIRDS VARIETIES AVAILABLE

Most of our birds are bred in our own aviary. They are extremely active, healthy and compatible. We have chosen these four species because they are generally passive and will get along well together in mixed flights. They are paired and pre-bonded weeks before they are delivered to your facility. This is just another way we try to insure all birds are getting along. All birds have a 90 day health guarantee, if any die within the 90 days; they will be replaced at no charge to you.

Society Finches; 2 pair



In the US they are known as Society Finches, perhaps because of their reputation for being so very sociable, to others across the globe they are known as Bengalese Finches. While there are names but there is only very unique bird, the Society Finch can claim something no other finch can thus far, it exists only in captivity. It has never existed in a wild state anywhere on the planet. It is a completely man made finch, domesticated many centuries. Regardless, the Society is one of the most enjoyable finches to keep and breed. You will know the males by their very cute song and dance.

The Star Finch- These are attractive, friendly, and peaceable birds named for the twinkling white spots that give them a sparkling appearance. They are sociable birds that should never be kept alone; keeping one or more pairs will satisfy their need for social contact and allow you to observe them behaving more as they would in a small flock in the wild.



Owl Finches-This finch is a very striking Australian bird. These are perhaps one of the smallest of the Australian birds averaging about 4 inches. Owl finches are highly social and will engage in clumping and all preening. Pair bonds are very strong and pairs may remain together throughout the year, even when not breeding.



Lady Gouldian Finches-The Gouldian finch is arguably the most vividly colorful bird on earth. Its native habitat is the northern region of Australia. Three varieties of Gouldian Finches are naturally-occurring in color

1) The red-headed 2) The black-headed 3) the yellow-headed

Although these are the color varieties generally recognized, there is any number of combinations derived from these basic colorations. Including blue and yellow-bodies mutations. These are a very passive bird and mix well with other passive species; all of the above.



Caring for the Birds

Birds should always have an abundant supply of food. Your new aviary includes hanging feeders that hold a lot of seed. You need to make sure they always have seed in them, always refill before they go completely empty. You may want to keep live plants in the cage; they not only look and smell lovely, the birds LOVE to chew on the blossoms and leaves. Kalanchos are one of our bird's favorites. I keep two for every cage, once the birds have devoured one; I replace it with another one and just keep rotating them. You can pinch the flowers back and they will re-blossom in a short time. Maybe one of the Residents would like to be the "Flower Child" in charge of the plants.
